EXECUTIVE COUNCIL REPORT - November 9, 2017

AAUW Executive Council Meeting November 9, 2017 - 1:30 a.m. at Sandy Davini's

Those in attendance were the following: Joann Nixon, Executive Council Leader; Sandy Davini, Treasurer; Barbara Solheim, Program; Janet Theiss, Communications Leader; Karen Tuttle, Bylaws Leader; Jeanine Rounds, Secretary.

Members at Large present were: Priscilla Kerr, Joan Young, and Artis Buerki

Call to Order, 1:40 <u>Minutes</u> of October 11, 2017, were approved as presented

Council Leader Report: Joann announced that the December Executive Committee will meet at 1:30 on December 14 at the Davini's, and the STEM group will also meet there, starting at 11:00. Members are encouraged to bring "brown bag" lunches. Joann said she had written the Sutter County and Yuba County superintendents of schools regarding their scholarship donations for our Tech Trek girls. Artis responded to Sandy's comments about seeking donations for our STEM projects by saying that she will contact Soroptimist of Marysville-Yuba City new president, Diane Warnock, to see if they have budgeted the exchange of donations as we usually do and she will arrange the exchange and report back to the EC next month.

There was also considerable discussion over the failure of AAUW members of California to approve change of incorporation to comply with AAUW National. There were 3,160 votes cast and all but 26 were "yes," but

those 26 'no' votes will deny AAUW California the legally required change from being a mutual benefit organization to being a public benefit organization to match the classification that AAUW National already has! A second vote will be conducted, and there was considerable discussion about the need to assure that all our members vote "yes," as failure to pass this will result in significant costs because of change in state status.

Correspondence: Sandy passed out correspondence, which included a number of requests for donations; anyone who was interested could take the information. We also received a "thank you" letter from the Alzheimer's Association for our \$100 donation.

<u>Treasurer's Report and Proposed Budget</u>: Sandy gave a brief budget report, saying very little had changed since her last report.

<u>Public Policy:</u> Martha Bunce has regularly sent out information via email, and this information will also be presented in the monthly <u>Feather Vane</u>.

<u>Membership:</u> Sandy said current membership, including scholarship winners, is 94. There are some potential members considering joining.

Other reports from Executive Council

<u>Historian/Bylaws Update:</u> As indicated above, the change that was to have been made to the state bylaws failed because there were some who voted against. Not sure what will happen next, or whether our tax level will be affected.

<u>Communications:</u> Janet Theiss; <u>Feather Vane</u>: Artis reminded us that 11/20 is deadline for information to her. Janet noted we will continue to look for a replacement for Ethel Breyfogle, who mails the *Feather Vanes*, rosters, and Garden Tour tickets; <u>Meeting Callers</u>: Joan Young reported callers will complete their calls this weekend.

<u>Programs:</u> Barbara Solheim said that Lisa Del Pero, a lawyer, will talk on "Aging Intelligently," which has largely to do with various legal choices and related activities; and the meeting will be at Sopa Thai. Members who attend that meeting will be encouraged to pay at that time also for the December 9th Coalition

meeting at the Peach Tree if they plan to attend it. There was a brief discussion regarding next year's schedule, as we will not be able to hold our September meeting at the Ulreys' or at Lee Jones' homes.

<u>Projects:</u> Carol Clark was out of state, but the following presentations were made:

STEM: The committee had met earlier today, and things are going well. Martha Bunce has identified 22 excellent speakers. Jeanine has arranged for facilities at the college. Lee Jones, working with Roberta D'Arcy is identifying the facilitators and needs several more. Barbara Alves has sent out a "Save the Date" email to the schools. June McJunkin has sent out the registration packets and has arranged for Packet Day to be held again at the Sutter County Schools facility, on January 11. Barbara Solheim and Carol Clark will manage the Hospitality Room on campus.

Garden Tour: Brief meeting was held recently. Martha has located several gardens, but we need more private gardens. The garden tour and reception will be held at the Agriculture program at Marysville High School under the direction of Bonnie Magill, the instructor, and the garden will include a wide variety of high school ag programs. Janet Theiss and Judy Hale will be the hostesses.

Tech Trek: Joann announced that a good meeting had recently been held and several will be going to the state meeting. Karen Chiechi is also going to assist the committee. Carol will be the state contact.

Scholarships: No current report.

Other Business

Interbranch: Janet reported on the recent IBC meeting at Pete's in Yuba City; Joann and Jeanine had also attended. IBC was very interested in our Coalition event, and Janet will invite them. A major item of discussion was our responsibility to provide a speaker for the annual IBC meeting, which will be in Paradise. After considerable discussion, we agreed to see if we could get Gallagher or his representative and a representative of Garamendi to be our speakers and to talk about what they are doing to help women. Jeanine will contact a Garamendi representative. Joann Nixon will contact Gallagher's office.

Opportunity Drawings: There was considerable discussion about how many raffles we want to include at our meetings. It was agreed that we will limit it to 3 for this year: the September meeting, the December coalition, and the April meeting at the college. Priscilla Kerr indicated that she needs some substantial items for the Coalition Raffle.

New Business: Nothing introduced. Meeting adjourned at 3:25.
