OVER THE YEARS – How AAUW Membership Requirements Have Changed -



BUT NO CHANGES THIS YEAR

AAUW members from all over the country had an opportunity to vote to decide if a college degree should be dropped as a requirement for AAUW membership, or if an "Advocate Membership" for non-degreed individuals should be established. **Because neither ballot issue passed, it was announced at the Annual Conference in June that the guidelines for membership have not changed. Here is how rules for membership have developed over the years:**

1881 - Graduates of only a few universities were invited to the meeting in November of 1881 when Marion Talbott and Ellen H. Richards, and 15 of their women friends, met in Boston to start an organization meant to open doors of higher education to other women. The charter institutions were Wesleyan Univ. (Conn), and the Massachusetts Inst. of Technology. Soon afterwards other colleges and universities were admitted as charter members. These were Vassar, Wellesley, Cornell, Smith, Oberlin, the Univ. of Wisconsin, and the Univ. of Michigan.

1882 - In January of 1882, 65 women officially formed the organization called the **Association of Collegiate Alumnae (ACA)**.

1884 - The first branch of ACA was established in Washington D.C., and in **1886** branches were also formed in New York, Philadelphia, Boston, and San Francisco.

1889 - Another similar organization, the Western Assoc. of Collegiate Alumnae (est. 1883) merged with ACA, and they established this membership policy for educational institutions: Colleges and universities must display high academic standards, adequate provision for women students, women on faculties and administration, a sound basis of liberal education, and intellectual freedom.

1898 - ACA established an Educational Legislation Committee to promote further educational opportunities for women and girls. By the **1900s** it advocated child labor laws, compulsory education, juvenile courts, and funding for public schools and libraries. In **1913** ACA began Pay Equity efforts, and in **1914** it formed a committee to aid women students coming to the US from other nations.

1921 - Just one year after the 19th Amendment was passed giving women the Right to Vote, the ACA merged with the Southern Association of College Women, and the name was changed to the **American Association of University Women (AAUW)**.

1949 - In June of 1949 the bylaws were revised so that the only requirement for membership was a college degree, therefore reaffirming that women college graduates of all races are eligible for AAUW membership. Our branch was chartered in **1955**. In **1987** AAUW membership was extended to male college graduates.

2005 - With a growing population of women entering economically advantageous careers with community college educational backgrounds, AAUW's National Conference voted to include graduates who hold an Associate or equivalent degree (such as RN) from qualified educational institutions. There have been no further changes in membership requirements since that time. EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MEETING June 8, 2017

AAUW Executive Council Planning Meeting was on June 8, 2017 - 10:00 a.m. at the home of Jeanine Rounds. Members brought delicious salads for their lunch.

Those in attendance were the following: Joann Nixon-Executive Council Leader; Carol Clark-Program; Sandy Davini-Treasurer; Lee Jones-Membership; Janet Theiss-Communications Leader; Karen Tuttle-Bylaws Leader; Jeanine Rounds-Secretary, Members at Large: Priscilla Kerr and Joan Young.

Call to Order, 10:20 am **Minutes, Reports:** Minutes of May 11, 2017, were approved as submitted.

Counsel Leader Report: Joann said that we had well met our goals for the past year: membership, visibility, and collaboration. Membership is up, Artis Buerki is doing particularly well with community visibility, and we continue to collaborate with IBC, our other branches, and Soroptomists. We need to review our year's activities and plan for the year to come. She was requested to please email our meeting agendas 5-7 days in advance and she agreed. Members said they could review and update as needed at the time of the meeting.

Correspondence: None

Treasurer's Report and Proposed Budget: Sandy gave a substantial report of the expenses of the past year and recommendations for the year to come. She said we should have a reserve of nearly \$12,000 at year's end. Members then discussed changes we could make in our budget planning. They include: 1) increasing what we pay to our annual auditor from \$50 to \$100; 2) increasing the honorarium we give to our speakers from \$50 to \$100; 3) keeping the amount requested for lunches to \$18; 4) comping the lunch cost for a first time visitor who may become a member; 5) increasing the number of girls we send to Tech Trek from 6 to 8; and 6) not charging for the opening meeting in September. There was considerable discussion on the feasibility of being able to send additional girls, as we were not allowed to increase the number for this year. Janet said she would contact Carol Holsgrafe to explore possibilities.

Lee suggested we might consider increasing our donation to the Mary Aaron Museum from \$25 to \$50, to the Yuba Sutter Arts Council from \$50 to \$100, and to the Sutter Museum from \$35 to \$100. Carol Clark moved and Lee Jones seconded that we approve the budget including the changes as we discussed. It will need to go to the membership for approval in September.

Public Policy: No report.

Other reports from Executive Council

Historian/Bylaws Update: Karen Tuttle said we will need to wait until after 6/15 for the information about the by-laws changes until national voting is completed; October will probably be the voting time for us. Among the major potential changes are the guidelines for membership. College degree requirements may be dropped.

Communications: Janet Theiss reported. **Feather Vane:** Next one will be early September; **Roster:** Janet needs update info by August 1. **Calling:** Joan Young will begin this task in the fall.

IRS Election: We have been warned that there may be possible changes in AAUW's IRS category, with a vote to be taken in the fall. It will be very important for all our members to register to vote, and they will need their AAUW ID number. Sandy provided several copies of the list of members with their ID numbers, urging us all to copy down our number. Janet said it should be advertised in FV that those needing to know their numbers could contact her.

Membership: Lee Jones said things are going well; members spent some time discussing ways in which we might expand our membership. One strong suggestion was that anyone bringing in a new member should be sure to phone and contact the person, offer to drive her to a meeting, and do other things to maintain contact.

Programs. Barbara Solheim was out of town, but Sandy provided much of the information. Most have been arranged, including an October one on dementia, a November one by Lisa Del Pero on estate planning, February will be on Scamming. March will be at Sunsweet, and the April meeting will be held at Yuba College, with a vice president from Rideout Hospital. Our June meeting will be held at the Refuge. There was some discussion of augmenting the program with something beyond the scholarship winners and an intensive review of previous year's activities. Possibility of local olive oil tasting or wine tasting was brought up. Not sure how Refuge will feel about that, and Jeanine may look into it. We did have an olive oil tasting at Ruthy's a number of years ago.

Projects: STEM: Carol said the date of January 19 has been approved by the college.

Garden Tour: All went very well. We made over \$6,000.

Tech Trek: The annual pizza party was held at the home of Marilyn Warmee, and organized by Liane Carlsen. Joann, Sandy, Carol, and a teacher will visit the Davis program on July 27 on guest day. The issue of the chair for TT is still being discussed, with one possibility being to have a tri-chair leadership.

Scholarships: Jeanine said the college's new computer was difficult to use, and the group of 3 who selected the winners will be sending revised guidelines to the college.

Other Business - Interbranch: No recent news. The summer meeting will be in August and will be in Chico or Gridley. **Sunshine.** No requests.
