# Council Chat: January 19, 2019



What do I like about AAUW? When I moved to this area in 2002, I knew I wanted a woman's group. At first I joined the local Soroptimist club, which is a group for business and professional women who meet weekly. But when I geared down my business, and tired of the weekly meetings, I looked again, and my friend Barbara McCarty invited me to join AAUW. It has filled my needs for socialization and volunteering. I enjoy the women very much and especially enjoy the fact that we help girls understand the value of education through Tech Trek, STEM Conference and college scholarships. When I first arrived after marriage in the Marysville-Yuba City area from the Bay Area over 60 years ago, I joined the local chapter of the League of Woman Voters. <u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Sandy Davini gave a substantive update to current Treasurer's report. She indicated that we had received some major donations, including from the Yuba County Office of Education and from the Sutter County Office of Education, as well a donation from Joan Young in honor of Jean Jacuzzi, a member who had recently passed away. In addition, we have begun to receive donations from various organizations in relation to the Garden Tour program. Our insurance costs for the STEM conference have increased. Jeanine Rounds moved and Carol Clark seconded the motion to approve report/Motion passed.

<u>Public Policy</u>: Martha Bunce indicated considerable concern about changes to Title IX by the Department of Education that will change the level of protection for women in colleges/universities who have been sexually assaulted; she indicated that AAUW is very opposed to the change as it puts women more at risk.

<u>Membership</u>: Lee Jones indicated concern in the three members we have lost in the past few months: Bernice Higdon, Ruth Anthony, and recently Jean Jacuzzi. AAUW provides \$50 for each member to our Sutter County Library for the purchase of books that would have been of interest to those members. She also encouraged our committee to continue to try to bring in new members.

**Other reports from Executive Council:** <u>Bylaws Update:</u> Karen Tuttle said no business this month.

<u>Communications.</u> Janet Theiss <u>Feather Vane</u>: next issue: a reminder that Artis would like information by 1/21. Artis also said that Katherine Jankowski is doing an excellent job of getting information about our monthly meetings in the area newspapers; also our Facebook viewers are growing.

<u>Programs</u>: Barbara Solheim: Our <u>January 19th meeting</u> will be at the Museum; unfortunately, the museum is

undergoing major reconstruction, but arrangements will be made to assure we have the space we need. Jeanine said she contacted Salim about the menu, and the main dish will be lasagna. Speaker will be the museum director. The February meeting speaker will be Preet Didbal, and meeting will be at the Adventist/Rideout Conference Center on Plumas.

Projects: STEM -Sandy Davini and Barbara Solheim said that the Committee met earlier today and things are going well. Martha Bunce is still looking for speakers, and members are encouraged to contact her regarding possibilities. The STEM meeting is scheduled at Yuba College for April 2 due to the late holiday return of YCUSD. Garden Tour - Date will be May 4. Martha Bunce reported that we currently have 8 gardens, and some will be in Yuba County as well as Sutter County. Tech Trek - Carol Clark attended the coordinating meeting in Sacramento on January 6; no branch will be allowed to send more than 6 students. Carol met earlier this week with several members of our team to get our process organized. Much of the information this year will be emailed to the schools. Dr. Karen Chiechi sent the preliminary information to the teachers in December. The recommendations are due from the teachers by February 8, and the essays will be due by 2/22. We will need to meet and review the initial essays on February 27 and make our final selection on March 6. Because Carol must start her work at the schools on February 1, a great deal of support is needed. Donna Long will host the essay review meetings. Scholarship - Jeanine Rounds said she had not yet heard from the college about any changes.

**Other Business: Interbranch** - Janet Theiss reminded us about the meeting in Chico on February 2. She will write an article about the event for the upcoming <u>Feather Vane</u>. Jeanine Rounds and Carol Clark plan to attend. Concern was expressed about AAUW members who were seriously impacted in the disastrous fire in Paradise, and donations may be made. **Historian** - No report. **Sunshine** - Chris Billeci is having surgery, and Gretchen Cupp will be notified to send a card.
