Our guest speaker on February 15 will be Professor Abrar Shaukat Ph.D. He will talk about discoveries in space over the last century. Professor Shaukat started his college education at Yuba College in 1999 and transferred to UC Davis in 2001, where he received his Ph.D. in Theoretical Physics. After graduating, he got a second masters in Mathematical Finance from Columbia University in New York. Having missed California, he started looking for a job back home and found one in the bay area building mathematical models to assess the financial risks of various natural and man-made catastrophes and at AIG's Enterprise Risk Management group based in New York. Several years ago he received an opportunity to return to Yuba College to teach physics and astronomy, and recently he is teaching at the Woodland Community College campus which is a part of the Yuba College system.

#### Equal Pay Day is March 31 – Wear Red

The next Equal Pay Day (EPD) is Tuesday, March 31, 2020. This date symbolizes how far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year. The National Committee on Pay Equity https://www.payequity.org/day.html reminds us to wear red to symbolize how far women and minorities are "in the red" with their pay. This is a great idea for branch members working EPD tables in their communities or at local colleges. AAUW's publication The Simple Truth update is based on the most recently released data from the U.S. Census Bureau. In 2018, women received just 82 cents for every dollar paid to a man. Women of color often face a wider gap: compared to white men, Black women make 62 cents on the dollar, and Latinas make 54 cents on the dollar. The pay gap has only decreased by a nickel in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. For more information on the Gender Pay Gap, and ideas for EPD events, check out

https://www.aauw.org/resource/how-to-equal-pay-day/. On the National Level, the *Paycheck Fairness Act* passed in the House of Representatives and languishes in the Senate with no action yet taken. The Equal Pay Act requires that men and women be given equal pay for equal work in the same establishment. The jobs need not be identical, but they must be substantially equal. It is job content, not job titles, that determines whether jobs are substantially equal. Specifically, the EPA provides that employers may not pay unequal wages to men and women who perform jobs that require substantially equal skill, effort and responsibility, and that are performed under similar working conditions within the same establishment. According to WAGE (Women Are Getting Even), women earn one million less than men in their lifetime. AAUW has Feather Vane, FEB. 2020



# Secretary's Report

The AAUW Executive Council met on January 9, 2020, 1 pm at Sutter County Schools Board Room. Those in attendance were: Liz Skelly, Executive Council Leader, Sandy Davini, Treasurer; Barbara Solheim, Program Group Leader; Janet Theiss, Communications; Joan Young, Projects; Jeanine Rounds, Secretary; Members at Large present were, Gwyn Baker, Artis Buerki, Carol Clark, Joann Nixon

Call to Order, 1:00 Minutes of December 12, 2019 Executive Council were approved.

#### Information/Action Items.

<u>February IBC Interbranch Meeting</u>: The meeting will be in Gridley at the Moose Lodge on February 1. Cost is \$17 for the lunch. Those attending must let Janet know and should give her their check in advance, but Janet said it would be possible, if she knows someone is coming but can't get a check to her in time, for her to pay the cost and be reimbursed later. Our responsibility is the gift basket for speaker; Jeanine indicated she might have a basket available. Liz volunteered to buy the stuff from our branch for the basket.

<u>Potential Yuba College AAUW Club:</u> Artis said she would like us to pursue this option again. We would need a faculty member at Yuba to agree to be the contact. But if such an activity were made available and Yuba College would pay the \$100 annual fee, then students would be eligible to join the AAUW at no cost. Many California community colleges provide this opportunity. Artis said Martha Bunce has agreed to check with such a college to determine procedures and activities.

Public Policy Report: Martha Bunce was absent, No report.

#### **Reports from Executive Council**

Executive Council Leader Report: Liz wished the Council a Happy New Year.

<u>Correspondence:</u> Sandy passed out limited correspondence including a thank you from Girls on Run North State for our donation and quickly moved on to the budget report.

<u>Treasurer's Report and Proposed Budget:</u> Budget for the coming year looks good, but nothing has yet been received by Yuba County Office of Education. Liz will pursue. Artis volunteered to check with Soroptimist club of Marysville-Yuba City to see if they are going to donate this year.

Membership: Lee Jones was absent but had reported we have 86 members.

<u>Nominating Committee</u>: Artis reported that only one current position needs to be filled, and a candidate will be nominated for that position. However, the Bylaws position is still vacant, and the Council will be appointing. Artis agreed that the issue should be resolved by the next Council meeting. Nominations are reported at the February Branch meeting, printed in March FV; nominations from floor in April Branch, and elections follow.

<u>Communications</u>: Janet Theiss reported. All seems to be going well. Artis Buerki raised a communication issues regarding the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Women's Right to Vote. See Other Business below. Artis reported information is needed for the February <u>Feather Vane</u> by January 20. Joan Young said calls and emails for Branch meeting will commence this weekend.

<u>Programs:</u> Barbara Solheim indicated Marcello's will be serving lunch at the January meeting, when we will have a novelist as our speaker. Salim will cater for the February meeting when Dr. Abrar Shaukat will speak on what we learned about space in the past century. Barbara Douyon is also emailing information, and Joan Young said she would have her callers emphasize the same.

**STEM:** Sandy reported the committee had an excellent meeting earlier this morning. <u>Packet date will be March 20 at the Sutter</u> <u>County Annex</u>. The <u>conference will be Monday</u>, <u>March 30</u>. Martha has 17 confirmed speakers and several other probable ones. June McJunkin has been very helpful in getting initial information out to the schools. Gwyn Baker will be working to confirm sufficient facilitators. We will need around 30, as we use several in a variety of ways on campus. Barbara Alves and Janet Val Alstyne will be responsible for providing all the appropriate information to those identified both initially and after they arrive on campus. We need to assure that we use the same procedure for seating students in the gym, as it worked very well last year. Preet Didbal will be the keynote speaker again.

**Garden Tour:** Date will be May 2. Martha Bunce not present, but Sandy reported she and Martha and Liz had been checking out a number of gardens, but don't yet have all they need.

**Tech Trek**. Carol Clark reported that some of our new members will be working on this year's committee, and Nancy Johnston will be going with her to the North State Coordination meeting next week. The nominating forms all went out to the schools just before the holidays. She was pleased that a former TT member, now a high school student, is interested in being a junior counselor. We will again be sending 6 girls to the Davis program.

**Team of Extraordinary Minds--TEM**: Joann says she is continuing to encourage members to attend our February Branch meeting on Space; the TEM program has a budget of \$500 to assure the girls' lunch is covered.

**Scholarships:** Liz indicated the amount of money available remains uncertain, and we need additional information; she said she should have it soon. Artis queried as to whether we could just offer scholarships without involving the college, but others indicated that would be a very difficult activity.

**Other Business: Historian -** No report; **Sunshine -** No report; **Coalition -** All went very well. Sandy indicated we think we made \$564, but a check for \$50 is still in process.

**Women's Right to Vote:** Artis raised the issue that this year is the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Women's Right to Vote. Linden Reynolds had forwarded to her the materials and activities of our local AAUW on the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 1995. Liz will contact the Yuba and Sutter Boards of Supervisors before March and arrange to deliver the proclamation to them at their meeting. We also may fund attractive bookmarks emphasizing the anniversary, as was done before. Decisions to be made by March.

**Named Gift Honoree Tray.** There was considerable discussion about what to do with this tray, which annually recorded the names of the woman (or women) identified as the outstanding member of the year as identified after our Tea Bag activity and reported to National. One tray was completely covered and donated to our holdings at the Library, but the new tray has just a few names, and we had decided not to continue recording them on the tray. Carol Clark has had possession of it for several years. Artis and some others felt we should at least bring it up to date, and Artis volunteered to get it engraved; we can continue discussion of the appropriate procedure at the next meeting.

Future Agenda Items: Replacement for Bylaws leader; Scholarship funding; Honoree Gift Tray
