Program Notes by Gwyn Baker, Program Leader

Dr. Phuong Luu is our speaker at the November 21 branch meeting via Zoom. Dr. Luu is the Public Health Officer of Yuba and Sutter Counties.

Dr. Phuong Luu joined Yuba and Sutter counties in mid-January and since then, has been leading the bi-county COVID-19 response; she even acted as interim Public Health Officer for Butte County for two months while they searched for a permanent replacement for Dr. Andy Miller, who retired in July.

Before joining Yuba-Sutter, Dr. Luu was the medical director of public health in the Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands, a small U.S. territory in the Pacific with a population of approximately 50,000, for four and a half years. There, she worked on a variety of public health issues including emergency preparedness and recovery following a super typhoon in 2018; surveillance and management of communicable diseases such as tuberculosis, STDs and dengue fever; and programmatic and policies to address non-communicable diseases prevention such as hypertension, diabetes, and chronic kidney disease.

She graduated from University of Washington School of Medicine with honors in 2010 before serving her Internal Medicine Residency – Primary Care Track at George Washington University through 2013. She then had a General Internal Medicine Fellowship at Johns Hopkins University from 2013 to 2015. While at Hopkins, she also obtained a Master of Health Sciences in Clinical Epidemiology. During that time, her research focused on transitions of care and end of life goals discussion. She holds an active California State Medical License.




Did You Know? Did you

Update on dog shelter - fall 2020

The North Complex fire was the 4th declared disaster that Yuba Sutter Domestic Animal Disaster Assistance (YSDADA) has responded to. We are activated by the Office of Emergency Services which directs us where to set up. We began the shelter on Sept. 8th and closed it on Sept. 25th. All the dogs we sheltered had been brought in by their owners, and most owners were able to come and get them when we notified them we were closing. We sheltered a total of 67 dogs. BOOKS I've enjoyed -

Journey to Munich by Jacqueline Winspear

Jacqueline Winspear Is a present day writer, born in Kent, England, and now living in California. If you like historical novels, you will like her writings. I met Maisie Dobbs in her first novel by the same name, as a 13 year old girl who goes to work as a maid in the home of a wealthy family. The Maisie Dobbs series takes us through her participation as an 18 year old nurse in the Great War, and into pre-WW2 as she is now a private detective, psychologist/investigator in Journey to Munich, set in 1938. Maisie is working with the British Secret Service on an undercover mission. She's sent to Hitler's Germany. The German government has agreed to release an important British subject from prison, but only if he is handed over to a family member; and Maisie, posing as the daughter, is off to Dachau, outside of Munich, to bring him home.

Winspear writes with a knowledge of the English countryside, a firm understanding of history, and a sensitive and intelligent story-telling style. Ever since my AAUW reading group, AVID Readers, read the very first Maisie Dobbs book, probably 10 years ago, I've been able to relate to, and care about, the characters, most of whom, including her family and her staff, who are carried over from book to book. If you like mystery stories, and

historical novels, you will enjoy reading any of the more than a dozen Jacqueline Winspear books. They do not have to be read in order.

TRUST by Pete Buttigieg

The book entitled <u>Trust</u> has literally just gone to press. The author, Pete Buttigieg, was a former two-term mayor of South Bend, a 2020 Democratic presidential candidate, a Rhodes Scholar, a Navy veteran, and an openly gay man.

Buttigieg contends that our success or failure at confronting the greatest challenges of the decade--racial and economic justice, pandemic resilience and climate action-- will rest on whether we can effectively cultivate, deepen, and, where necessary, repair the networks of trust that are now endangered, or for so many, have never even existed.

The author's varied personal experiences allow him to cite numerous examples of the loss of trust (in each other, in our leaders and between nations). Yet he also suggests ways that trust can be restored.

This book is a fast read and will, I believe, be as well received by critics as was his first book, The Shortest Way Home. If you are concerned about what's been happening in America, you will find this book very thought provoking.

PUBLIC POLICY REPORT - SB 973 Signed by the Governor!

In 2018, AAUW co-sponsored a bill requiring companies with more than 100 employees to collect and report to the Department of Fair Employment and Housing data on:

- 1. The number of employees by race, ethnicity, and sex for 10 job categories;
- 2. The number of employees by race, ethnicity, and sex, whose annual earnings fall within certain pay bands:
- The total number of hours worked by each employee counted in each pay band during the reporting year.

The purpose of the bill is "to allow for designated state agencies to collect wage data to more efficiently identify wage patterns and allow for targeted enforcement of equal pay or discrimination laws." The bill failed in 2019, and was re-introduced last year by the same author, Senator Hannah-Beth Jackson (D-Santa Barbara), and was signed by Governor Newsom on September 30th – the last day in the last hour!

Fifteen other AAUW California-supported bills were also signed by the Governor, including: improved medical care for incarcerated pregnant women (AB732); protection for women testifying in sexual assault cases from having their testimony of alcohol or drug use at the time of the assault used against them in a separate prosecution (AB1927); addition of "sexual harassment" as a form of prohibited sex discrimination in higher education (SB493); and expansion of the California Family Rights Act to require any employer with 5 or more employees to grant a request by an employee to take up to 12 workweeks of unpaid protected leave during any 12month period to bond with a new child or to care for themselves or a child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner (SB1383).

Finally, as part of our "white allyship" posture, we are proud to have supported six bills that were enacted to address racial injustice and/or to enhance opportunities for Black women: AB979, requiring corporations to include a specified number of members from underrepresented communities on their boards of directors; AB1196 and AB1506, regulating police use of force; AB1460, requiring ethnic studies as a graduation requirement in CSU schools; AB3070, addressing discriminatory use of peremptory challenges in jury selection; and AB3121, establishing a task force to study and develop reparation proposals.

the Nominating Com. will need to find 1 or 2 new officers for the 2021-22 branch year.

AAUW Mission & Action Renewed STEM Momentum

Thanks to a generous bequest from AAUW member and scientific pioneer Nancy Grace Roman, AAUW is pursuing several important STEM initiatives this fall. Roman, who died in 2018, served as NASA's first chief astronomer and is known as the mother of the Hubble Telescope. We're launching projects to increase STEM participation by women of color and expand opportunities in the physical sciences and engineering. We'll also assess how parents and guardians can influence higher educational choices for girls.
