Our guest speaker will be Colonel Shannon Juby. She commands the 9th Mission Support Group at Beale Air Force Base and is a popular speaker at our annual STEM

conference. As Wing Commander she leads and supervises over 1,500 military and civilian personnel, manages a \$33.5 million budget, and oversees resources including more than 550 facilities. Before her current position, she was Chief of Staff for the Directorate for Policy, Strategy, Partnering, and Capabilities, U.S. European Command. She entered the Air Force in 1995 as an ROTC graduate with a degree in Computer Science. She is an F-16 pilot with combat time in Operations Southern Watch and Iraqi Freedom. She and her husband have three children. We look forward to visiting with her via Zoom at our March 20 branch meeting.

Unfortunately for our branch, this will impact our ability to host our annual STEM conference for eighth grade girls on campus. Also, the college can't host **any** gatherings until we reach

Equal Pay Day – WEAR RED

March 24, 2021 is Equal Pay Day, the day of the year that symbolizes how far into the new year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year. The National Committee on Pay Equity reminds us to WEAR RED to symbolize how far women and minorities are "in the red" with their pay.

On January 28, the bipartisan **Paycheck Fairness Act** was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives. We've worked for 24 years to pass this critical bill, and this is the year we'll succeed. We need to mobilize quickly to ensure we get it across the finish line. PAYCHECK FAIRNESS WEBINAR



February 2, 2021 -- Today I attended the webinar hosted by Kate Nielson from AAUW who discussed how the new administration hit the ground running on advancing opportunities for women, helping working families, ending workplace discrimination, protecting DACA recipients, and ending the sub-minimum wage for people with disabilities. They are in support of AAUW's mission to raise the minimum wage and pass the Paycheck Fairness Act. AAUW has been working for about 25 years to help pass the Paycheck Fairness Act.

The Paycheck Fairness Act would update and strengthen the Equal Pay Act of 1963 to ensure that it provides effective protection against sex-based pay discrimination in today's workplace. The bill takes several important steps, including: • Guaranteeing Non-Retaliation: The bill prohibits retaliation against workers for discussing or disclosing wages. Without the non-retaliation provisions of the Paycheck Fairness Act, many women will continue to be

silenced in the workplace—that is, prohibited from talking about wages with coworkers without the fear of being fired. This is an issue that keeps women—like it kept Lilly Ledbetter—from learning of the pay discrimination against them. • Prohibiting Reliance on Prior Salary History: The bill prohibits employers from relying on salary history in determining future pay, so that prior discrimination doesn't follow workers from job to job. • Requiring Job-**Relatedness**: The bill closes loopholes that allow employers to pay women less than men for the same work without a business necessity that is related to the job. • Equalizing Remedies: The bill ensures women can receive the same robust remedies for sex-based pay discrimination that are currently available to those subjected to discrimination based on race and ethnicity. • Providing Additional Assistance and Resources: The bill also provides technical assistance to businesses, requires wage data collection, and supports salary negotiation skills training programs to give women the tools to advocate for higher wages. This might finally be the year it gets passed!

BOOKS I've enjoyed -

Looking ahead to March Women's History Month, I've read a **Hazel Gaynor** novel that was published in late 2020 in the US and Canada under the name **When We Were Young & Brave**.

It begins in China during the earliest years of WWII, just following the bombing of Pearl Harbor, and during the Japanese occupation of China; and it continues through the liberation in 1945. It is a story, based on fact, about how a British missionary school in China, and its 125 American and British children and their teachers, survived in the prison camp under Japanese suppression in that remote area during a terrible war. This book was published under two names; the other title, **The Bird in the Bamboo Cage**, was used in the UK, Ireland, Australia, and New Zealand. I like that title better, what do you think?



This is the 9th novel by Hazel Gaynor. I have found her books, including the <u>Lighthouse</u> <u>Keeper's Daughter</u> (2018), to be engaging, and well researched. She is a native of

Ireland, and lives in Kildare with her husband and two children. If you haven't read anything by Hazel Gaynor, give her a try.

Another new book about outstanding women in history is **The Doctors Blackwell** by Janice P. Nimura. Just published in January 2021, it is about America's first woman to receive a medical degree in 1849, and her less known younger sister, Emily, who also became a doctor. Together they opened and ran a hospital for indigent women and children in New York City. I haven't read it yet as my copy just arrived yesterday.


