I think we're all looking forward to the Garden Tour after a two-year absence. The STEM Conference at Yuba College will already have occurred on March 28 by the time you read this, so we pulled that one off too. Turns out we were all a little rusty getting things pulled together for the STEM Conference and the GARDEN TOUR after the Pandemic. Imagine that. But our committees are doing a stellar job of it thanks to leadership of Sandy Davini and Martha Bunce and their fine committees. Our Feb.19 branch meeting was another success--the biggest turnout yet! Our members are happy to be meeting in person AND we are getting more new members every meeting. The Feb. speakers were Gordon Tom, local Chinatown historian (and former



dune buggy manufacturer and professional racer!) and Judy Mann, director of the Info-Center in Marysville. He's shown here with our member Karen Kam who introduced him to our group.

Gordon spoke about the arrival of the Chinese in San Francisco and Marysville in the 1850's, his grandfather among them. The Chinese came for gold mining, building the railroad, farming, and fishing. Interesting to note that there were four main Chinatowns in northern California (other than San Francisco): Marysville, Chico, Oroville, and Weaverville. Our Marysville Chinese School and Temple are the only ones owned by the Chinese in the US. Also, the Marysville Bok Kai Temple is the oldest Chinese temple in the US. Hopefully many of you were able to attend the Bok Kai parade on March 5. Judy Mann said you can come by the Info-Center at 317 4th Street in Marysville and sign up for a tour of our Chinatown. You'll be able to see the restored school and temple firsthand. Many thanks to Gordon and Judy for an entertaining and informative Saturday morning branch meeting. ## **MOVIE REVIEW** by Steve Clark

**DOG**, A real gem of a movie! Channing Tatum plays an injured former Ranger who has PTSD. He is ordered to transfer a Belgian Malinois dog to his former handler who, unfortunately, was killed in battle. This type of dog is one of the most aggressive dogs in existence.

Initially it is just a job for him and he is not really fond of the dog at all. If that is not bad enough, he is not personally happy. He has no idea about his working future; is kind of estranged from his 3-year- old daughter; and has to deal with his mental PTSD problem. However, the trip to the funeral of his former Ranger friend, is a long one. Oregon to Arizona by car. So the movie is really about 1) the experiences encountered via their car trip (they had a deadline to meet) and 2) the bonding that takes place between the dog and the man. Many funny things happen along the way!

The two arrive at the funeral destination in Arizona and Lulu goes over and lays at the empty boots of his former handler. Later, ordered to return the dog to the original departure camp, he cannot walk away from the dog. He adopts Lulu; returns to his ex-wife and daughter; and yes, Lulu lays on his boots at night. With more than a dozen years in film, Channing Tatum is best known for his action movies. The Magic Mike Series and Coach Carter come to mind. If you like the acting of Channing Tatum, look for him later this month starring in The Lost City with Sandra Bullock.

AAUW EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MEETING March 10, 2022 1:00 p.m. Via Zoom

Call to Order, Approval of the Agenda. The meeting was called to order at 1:04pm. Check in. Minutes of the February 10, 2022, meeting were approved by consensus. Agenda – No additional items were added to the agenda

**Information/Action Items**; Reminder to write your "job" description for the June EC meeting

Guest: Jay Lowden, Director of Yuba Community College Foundation

Mr. Lowden gave a report on the status of the AAUW scholarship and the Y C Women's Club. The Yuba City Women's Club is an endowed scholarship that AAUW disperses. The surviving members of the Women's Club will be asked to write a letter to request that the Yuba City Women's Club endowment account be un-endowed. Mr. Lowden indicated that he is checking with legal to see if this is possible. The Foundation will disperse the unrealized gains each June 30. Three \$500 scholarships are typically awarded each year from the AAUW Scholarship Fund. Mr. Lowden said that he would assist AAUW to promote our scholarship with a letter appeal to members, an online giving page that links directly to the AAUW scholarship and an embed link on the AAUW web page that will go directly to the AAUW scholarship fund. A response thank you email is immediately generated to the donor and to a designated member of AAUW. The misunderstanding regarding the

AAUW funds being endowed was discussed and the fact that the fundraising goal of \$30,000 was never achieved. An ad hoc committee will be formed to determine the focus of the AAUW scholarship including considering increasing the amount each student receives and launching a targeted campaign beginning in September or October.

The council discussed the feasibility of a "Friends of AAUW" status. The Nevada County branch has this as a membership option. Council thought that instead, priority should be given to getting the AAUW bylaws amended to be more inclusive by removing the college requirement.

#### **Reports from Executive Council**

Executive Council Leader's Report – Liz Skelly noted that it was great to see the article about the garden tour on the front page of the local newspaper. More partnering with other women's organizations is also something to continue to pursue.

Correspondence – Sandy Davini reported that correspondence was received from the local Arts Council information and Sutter County Museum. The Council thought it would be a good idea to raffle off the donated casino gift certificates at the April branch meeting and put the proceeds into the scholarship fund.

Treasurer's Report – Sandy Davin reported that sponsorships continue to come in for the Garden Tour and Tea Bag fundraiser. The National AAUW is raising its dues from \$62 to \$67; state dues remain \$20. A motion was made to keep our local branch dues the same, \$13 (for a total of \$100). It was unanimously approved.

A motion was made to increase the budget to up to \$25 per student helper for the STEM conference. It was unanimously approved.

Public Policy, Advocacy – Martha Bunce noted that Title IX is 50 years old. There is lots going on in public policy but of note, 110 members will attend Lobby week in April in California; March 15th is equal pay day.

Membership – Lee Jones reported that there are currently 85 members

Nominating Committee – Lee Jones reported that Sandy, Martha and Liz have agreed to run for new terms. Miriam Root is moving out of state and a replacement will be appointed. In April the slate will be presented to the membership. At the June meeting officers responsibilities will be decided upon.

Bylaws - Christy Estabrook - Nothing to report

Communications – Linda Zall not present. Artis reported that the Garden Tour info is on website and Facebook.

Deadline is March 15 for the next Feather Vane. Reservations -- Joan Young/Gwyn Baker-No report as there was no March branch meeting. Roster – Artis Buerki-No report.

Programs – Gwyn Baker reported that there are no branch meetings in March and May. April's presentation will be a local falconer. The June presentation will be by the Yuba Sutter Regional Arts Council, and they require proof of Covid vaccination which will be conveyed to the membership. Lee will follow up with the falconer re her April presentation.

STEM Conference -- Sandy Davini reported that the conference is on track for March 28. There are 489 girls coming from 17 schools. Help is needed for Packet Day on March 22.

Extra tickets will be available at the April meeting. Other tickets are being delivered to POP stores on March 21st; official ticket sales start March 23.
