about their experiences at our September branch meeting.

At our October 15th branch meeting AAUW members and their guests were treated to an informative presentation by Brittni Inks, Waste Zero Specialist for Recology.

We learned about where our waste goes after it's picked up, and all the new changes to what can go in the green bin. For those of you who weren't aware, food waste, including meat, bones, even that pasta alfredo



you left in the fridge for too long -- can all now go in the green compostable cart!

A big concern that members had was how to keep their green bin from getting yucky. I always have such a bed of lawn clippings in my cart, that it's easy to bury food waste in there, but if it's a concern you can put your food in a paper bag or wrap it in newspaper. It was interesting that as of this time, the new "compostable" produce bags should be kept out of the green bin. They might be biodegradable, but they don't currently get broken down in Recology's composting process. In other bag-related news, the bags you pay a dime for at the store, and then drop in the box that says "Recycle your plastic bags here" all end up in the trash for the most part. So bring a reusable bag when you go shopping! Brittni even handed out shopping bags. Those with more questions about what goes where are encouraged to

follow Recology on Facebook. It's one of the quickest ways to get your questions answered. By limiting the amount of trash sent to our rapidly growing landfills and composting our food waste to reduce methane emissions, we can all do our part to preserve the planet for the next generation.

ELECTION DAY NOVEMBER 8, 2022 HOW TO FIND INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR BALLOT

The League of Women Voters, long a reliable source of unbiased voter information, as well as an organization that takes positions on measures (not candidates) that meet its public policy priorities, was not able to come out to speak to us this October. On the plus side, it is not a very complicated ballot year. LWV has ballot recommendations on their website, and although they don't take a position on some of the measures, they provide insights as to why a measure might be well-meaning but flawed.

The AAUW CA page says:

"Congressional races are particularly important this November. Redistricting after the 2020 Census has changed the boundaries of many Congressional districts. In the current partisan climate, we need to be aware of what is at stake in both our national and state upcoming elections. Your current member of Congress may no longer represent you – be sure to become informed soon on the candidates for Congress in your district. As you sort through all this, please reflect on priority issues affecting us, our daughters, and granddaughters, and evaluate candidates' positions on these issues."


The best source of info Gwyn Baker (thank you!) found for determining your new district is on the CalMatters page. Most of us will no longer have Garamendi as our congressman.

Since 1978, the Pregnancy Discrimination Act has been the best defense for pregnant people

But many people who are pregnant still risk being forced out of the workplace simply for following doctors' orders. **The Pregnant Workers Fairness Act** would close the loopholes in the Pregnancy Discrimination Act and provide much-needed clarity to employers and workers to ensure workplace safety for pregnant workers.

The Pregnant Workers Fairness Act passed the House of Representatives in May 2021. However, despite bipartisan support in both chambers, the bill has stalled in the U.S. Senate ever since. Pregnant workers should not have to wait any longer for protection. No one should face discrimination in the workplace because of a pregnancy. Urge your senators to pass the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act before the midterm elections!



Audrey Ohlson-Smith Remembered

Audrey Ohlson Smith was born in Chicago in 1931 and was 2nd generation American from Sweden. She attended Northwestern University on a full scholarship, and taught elementary school in Illinois, California, and Michigan before being asked to 'retire' because she was pregnant with her first child (as was the custom of the time). While staying at home to raise her 4 children Audrey developed an interest in writing and politics. In Ann Arbor and in San Mateo she contributed to local papers and joined the San Mateo County Democratic Central Committee which led her to a career with the California Teachers Association where she represented teachers and their interests in the CA State Legislature.

Audrey passed away on July 16. She has had a dual membership with our AAUW branch and the Grass Valley branch since she moved from Browns Valley to Eskaton Retirement Village. Audrey was our branch President in 2004-2005, the year that I joined, and she came back to play the piano at the Coalition Holiday Brunch for many years. What a talented and fine lady she was.

MOVIE REVIEW – "See How They Run"

This movie is for fans of murder mysteries, Agatha Christie, theatre, film, and fine acting ensembles. It stars Sam Rockwell as Inspector Stoppard, Saoirse Ronan as Constable Stalker, David Oyelowo as the playwright Mervyn Cocker-Norris, and Adrian Brody as Leo Kopernick as a film director. The meeting was called to order at 1:05. Approval of Agenda. Regarding last month's minutes, a question was resolved regarding whether Live Oak has an AAUW Branch. Sandy checked the California list of branches and they do not. Minutes of Sept. 8 Executive Council were then approved unanimously.

2. Information/Action Items - Reminders to everyone to send their job descriptions digitally to Linda Zall and hard copy to Liz Skelly.

3.Reports from Executive Council

Executive Council Leader: Martha pointed out that there was a great photo in the newspaper of the Tech Tech girls who attended and spoke at the last branch meeting. Gywn commented that cell phone photos don't come out well in the meeting room so it makes a big difference to have a professional photographer.

Programs: Gwyn reported that speaker at this week's branch meeting will be from Recology. A

Garden Tour: Martha let us know that the tour would be emphasizing the south county.

TechTrek: Carol is waiting for the manual from the state to finalize the lengthy task list. So far, we have budgeted for 6 girls at \$1200 each.

TTAG: No information Scholarships: No report

Coalition Drawing: Linda said that Marysville Art Club is not participating so AAUW may be able to get more luncheon tickets. She will have flyers at the branch meeting and will plea for donations. The raffle brings in a significant amount of money.

Other Business: Lee suggested that a membership form be put on the website and Facebook. Sandy said that one could be on the net that would need to be printed and mailed. Meeting adjourned at 2:05
