# Council Chat by Lee Jones

Martha has asked me to write the Council Chat this month. It was good to see approximately thirty-five members and guests at our November19 meeting called to order by Liz Skelly.

I introduced our new member Jeannie Morrissey, and other guests were introduced. Gwyn Baker shared information about future programs planned in upcoming months including Editor of the Appeal Democrat Newspaper Robert Summa, The Homeless Consortium, and Blue-Zone. Gwen mentioned the April meeting date has been changed to April 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Today's speaker, Molly Bloom, was introduced by Gwyn Baker. Molly is the Director & Curator of the Sutter County Museum and she told us about her educational background and talked about the current exhibit at the museum. It is called Beauty and the Beast, which is about wildflowers of Northern California and climate change. She stressed the need for museum volunteers. Coming events include Trees and Traditions fundraiser on Dec. 2. The museum displays history of Yuba, Sutter and Colusa counties and over 20,000 items are included in the collection. On Saturday November 26 the gift shop will have a 20% off sale. Ettel Hall is available for rental for special events like weddings receptions, celebrations of life and other events. A grant funding is being used towards three new murals designed by local artists. Molly's talk was well received and followed with lots of interesting questions coming from our audience. The presentation was followed by a delicious soup and salad luncheon prepared by Hillcrest Catering. There will not be a branch meeting in December due to the December 10 Coalition Holiday Brunch. The next branch meeting is January 21, 2023.

This is a romantic comedy that pits two screen legends against each other - George Clooney & Julia Roberts. Just watching these two is a delight. Their chemistry and comedic timing are spectacular. message that there are three things needed for a decision to marry. These three things are time, place, and circumstances. These lessons are on a collision course that leads to a great finale.

# MOVIE REVIEW – She Said

The book She Said by investigative reporters Jodi Kantor and Megan Twohey is a detailed story about what eventually led to the newspaper articles in the New York Times and earned a Pulitzer Prize. The movie by the same name brings it to life. Their work has brought down one of the men in the movie industry who was finally charged and sentenced for what he'd done to women and quietly covered up for years through payoffs and threats. The book is not a novel, and the movie is not a salacious tell all, nor does it glamorize the crimes of more than one man mentioned in the movie and book. After due diligence finally in 2017 Jodi Kantor (played in the movie by Zoe Kazan) and Megan Twohey (played by Carey Mulligan) found women who were willing to talk about the movie producer's sexual abuses in an effort to save others from the degradation that they had experienced, and to protect other women from having to endure the same. The book is not an easy read, and the movie was hard to watch, but it shows the power in numbers and the effort of doing the right thing to protect others from being victimized.

# MOVIE REVIEW – <u>Till</u>

This is a movie about racism and violence in America, specifically in Mississippi in the 1950s. A young boy leaves his Chicago home to visit his relatives down south. His interactions with a white woman are mere childish bravado, the opposite of how his mother told him to behave. While the attack on the boy takes place off screen, the consequences are shown quite vividly. The boy's mother insists that everyone should see what has happened to her son, and it is shocking. So shocking, in fact that the assault and the mother's fruitless efforts to bring the perpetrators to justice galvanized not only the black community, but the country as a whole. The boy is played by Jalyn Hall, and the mother by Danielle Deadwyler, who makes her anguish real and moving.



Executive Council met on November 10, 2022 at 1 pm via zoom as the usual meeting room was unavailable. Attendees: Martha Bunce, Sandy Davini, Liz Skelly, Gwyn Baker, Lee Jones, Linda Zall, Ellen O'Neill, and MAL Kathy Nehl, Joann Nixon, Carol Clark

Minutes from October were approved with one change: Martha is the Branch Leader, not the president. General Information: Martha will be unavailable for the Nov. 19th General Branch meeting. Liz will chair the meeting and Lee will take notes for a report to be sent to the Feather Vane. Martha will take the computer to Liz.

Communication: Deadline for the Feather Vane is Tuesday, November 22nd at noon.

Job Descriptions: are still needed regarding Leader, Secretary and Treasurer. The latter is awaiting decision as to whether it will be a shared position or divided into Treasurer and Membership Treasurer. It was suggested that Job Descriptions be developed for the large projects such as STEM and Garden Tour. The committee agreed with Martha's suggestion that the "Task Lists" for each project are sufficient.

Nominating Comm: Sandy responded to Martha's query regarding what the by-laws state regarding the Nominating Committee. It needs to be appointed by the Executive Council and there must be three members. One as a chairperson. The members serve one year or a maximum of two consecutive terms. A report must be sent to the general membership 30 days prior to the April meeting.

Change of meeting date: Given Spring Break times, the committee decided to change the April branch meeting from April 15th to the 22nd. Sandy will check with Hillcrest catering as to whether the change can be accommodated.

Treasurer: Having spoken to Christy, Sandy stated that she has been calling other branches to ask if they split the role of Treasurer. So far she has not found any branch that has a membership treasurer. She will suggest to Christy that she contact AAUW California for advice regarding splitting duties.

Correspondence: The Branch received the regular update from the Arts Council and an invitation to Trees and Traditions from the museum Treasurer's Report: A copy of the report was emailed to all EC members.

Public Policy: There is nothing new from state or national AAUW. Proposition 1 passed. There was a discussion as to Martha's consideration of writing an article for the Feather Vane regarding abortion being a personal decision. Discussion followed as to the possibility of creating dissension within the membership. She will continue to consider the idea.

Membership: Lee is anticipating that one or two new members are "in the works". Ethel Jorgensen, Kathy Bertelsen and Jeannie Morrissey joined since the last meeting and will be welcomed at the November Branch meeting.

Nominating Committee: Martha will ask Christy Estabrook to be a member. Joyce Smith and Joann Nixon have agreed to be on the committee. There was a question as to how many officers will need to be nominated. Linda and Ellen agreed to stand for a new term. The treasurer must be elected every year. Sandy is willing to be an officer but not as the current duties demand. She and Liz will meet about a solution. If Liz becomes a "co-treasurer", a new Projects Chair will have to be recruited.

Rosters: Discussion ensued regarding the Executive Council getting regularly updated digital rosters of the membership. Linda will provide that after the holidays. Sandy gets a number of calls from members asking what their member number is, therefore, the idea was floated to include membership numbers in the 2023-2024 roster.

Programs: There may be a \$100 or so cost if the general meeting doesn't get 35 attendees. Gwyn reported that 32 members have given their RSVP for the meeting on the 19th. She has asked Molly to speak about things that people might not know about the museum. Many members are very familiar with it and go regularly. Future Programs: January-Blue Zones, Feb.- Robert Summa from the Appeal April-Homeless Consortium, June-Tri-Counties Diversity Projects.

STEM: Sandy said planning is on target, but facilities and registration details will need work before the meeting. Presenters are still needed. Liz will ask Dr. Dotson, YC College president to be the keynote speaker as she has already agreed to be a presenter. MARYSVILLE-YUBA CITY, CALIFORNIA, AAUW BRANCH Martha and Liz met with the new VP of Student Services who is very familiar with the needs of the day.

Garden Tour: Martha said that good progress is being made. A few more gardens are needed but there is time to do so. She states that she has a great committee with 2 new members.

Tech Trek: Branch Coordinators are meeting virtually on Monday. We need to know about cost and numbers of girls. Carol is awaiting the state manual.

Martha will be sending letters to the Sutter County Superintendent of Schools regarding a sponsorship for Tech Trek.

Scholarships: Liz was notified that 63 applicants needed review. There is usually little notice from the college for the timeline needed. More members are necessary due to the rapid turnaround often required with little notice. One on her committees couldn't help at all and the other was only able to review the last 6 that stood out to Liz. Bhavna Mahi is majoring in bioengineering, is president of the Jakarta Students, coaches high school basketball, has an outstanding GPA with a full load of science classes. The scholarship is \$500 for the Fall Semester. Though we

received a donation in August, it had to be based on the previous fiscal year balance. The Woman's Club scholarship was not available this year.

Other Business: Interbranch Council Meeting: Eleven people came on Saturday the 5th for the Yuba City lunch. Planning is ongoing for the annual luncheon which will be held in Redding on February 4th. Jan Britton from the Chico Branch is looking for someone to speak on Indigenous women and possibly, the ongoing tragedy of missing women.

Sunshine: Martha and Sandy mentioned that they are concerned for Janet Theiss. Gretchen Cupp is efficient with sending out the appropriate greeting cards to members. She's never requested reimbursement though it is covered in the budget. Sandy was asked to send her some stamps. Coalition Drawing: Linda requests everyone to bring raffle items to the General Meeting, however, she is willing to accept them at home or even, to come to get them. Other Business: Sandy suggested that members look for the CA. AAUW monthly webinar. The meeting was adjourned at 2:40 p.m.
