On Monday, March 27, 2023, 777 8th grade girls from 25 Yuba-Sutter schools will descend upon Yuba College in Marysville to learn more about the opportunities in the STEM professions (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math). The Marysville Yuba City branch of AAUW started offering the conference in 1985.

The committee has been working diligently with the local middle schools to get students enrolled and securing presenters and facilitators. Currently there are 20 presenters from a variety of STEM fields who will discuss aspects of their careers with the girls.

The keynote speaker for the morning will be Dr. Tawny Dotson who is President of Yuba College. Dr. Dotson is a dynamic leader in her third year at Yuba College.

At the conclusion of the half day conference, students have the option of taking a tour of the Yuba College campus. Many schools take advantage of this opportunity where their students can hear directly from current Yuba College students about the college experience.

# What is the TTAG Program? An Interview with Joann Nixon by Artis Buerki

TTAG stands for Tech Trek Alumni Group. Our branch's TTAG group started several years ago under the organization and direction of Joann Nixon. On her committee are branch members Kelly Swanson,

Jeanne Schultz, Manjit Jhutti, Barbara Douyon, and Karen Kam.

Tech Trek Girls who were chosen from participating schools in both counties and attended the Tech Trek Camps at UC Davis since 2016 have been invited to become a part of our Marysville-Yuba City branch TTAG program. AAUW California started expanding the Tech Trek Program in 2022 to include support for the TTAG program.

Joann Nixon said "I'm proud of the baby steps we have accomplished. This is the first we have heard from the State, and we are already meeting the goals. State is focusing on: *Post-Camp engagement, Activities, Volunteerism, and Building inclusive community among all alumnae and branch members.*"

"Here is what I feel we are doing to meet these goals", Joann said. "**Post-Camp engagement activities:** The TTAG girls go to the yearly pizza party for incoming Tech Trek selectees where the newly selected girls can learn from the experience of the older girls. **Volunteerism:** They participate as Junior Hostesses at the annual AAUW Garden Tour. **Building inclusive community among all alumnae and branch members**: They participate at the September branch meeting, and they attend the December TTAG meeting at my home with several years of TTAG members attending," Joann Nixon said. The Executive Council met on February 9, 2023, at 1 pm at the Sutter Office of Education Annex. In Attendance were Carol Anderson-Clark, Liz Shelly, Martha Bunce, Gwyn Baker, Ellen O'Neil, Sandy Davini, Kathy Neal, Christy Estabrook, Lee Jones, and Artis Buerki.

The meeting was called to order at 1:00. Minutes from the January meeting were approved with no changes.

Tech Trek: Carol has been the lead for 7 years. She would like to resign from the position but is happy to be of help to whomever takes over.

Martha said that the job description is so complex that it should be divided amongst at least 4 people. She also requested that those who have worked on it schedule a meeting to determine how duties can be divided in a logical grouping of tasks. Her suggestions were:

- 1. Contact with state coordinators/technology lead
- 2. Lead school contact
- 3. Outreach and hostess for the girls
- 4. Collecting essays and conducting interviews

These are just suggestions; the committee will determine labor divisions. Suggested members for this MARYSVILLE-YUBA CITY, CALIFORNIA, AAUW BRANCH committee: Carol, Donna Lo Joann Nixon, Ellen O'Neil, Kelly Swanson, Linda Zall. Carol will put a meeting together, hopefully on February 20th.

This year's camp is July 9 to 15. We can send five girls and the cost is \$1000.00 per girl.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Sandy pointed out that there is \$350.00 allocated for "Women's Support Group" but no group has yet been chosen. Other groups came under discussion as well as the idea to move the money to the MVYC Scholarship Fund. This will be taken up on the next agenda.

#### Public Policy: No report

<u>Membership:</u> Lee reported that there are two new members: Marci Watts and Diane Funston. The "Shape the Future" campaign in which dues are reduced to \$66.50 ends this month.

Lee passed out a New Member questionnaire for discussion. Linda re-did the old form to ready it for Google Drive. Birth month has been added. Also distributed was the "Welcome to Our Branch" handout. There was much discussion on each form as to what were appropriate and necessary questions. Artis always requests that new members submit a brief essay about themselves for the *Feather Vane*. The form can help them formulate the article or, if they choose not to write one, allows Artis to have the necessary information to compose one. Also, the Executive Council can reach out and support new members through the information on the forms.

STEM: Currently 777 girls are registered from 25 schools and 60 adults are attending. There are 19 presenters confirmed, committee would like to arrange for 2 more. "Packet Day" is at 9:00a.m. on March 21st in the conference room at the Superintendent of Schools Office and volunteers are needed. Monday, March 27 is the STEM conference at Yuba College.

<u>Garden Tour:</u> The reception site is 2121 Ranch, an event venue, therefore catering and Porta-Potties are necessary. Martha is seeking a donation for the latter. The committee is researching food trucks for the catering. The reception will open earlier than usual, at 11:00a.m.

Interbranch Coalition Brunch: Liz reported that there were at least 30 people in attendance in Redding. The venue was beautiful and the speaker, discussing the tragedy of murdered and missing Indigenous Women, was powerful.

<u>Historian:</u> Karen Tuttle has resigned. Artis mentioned that she met someone who is writing a book about women's organizations in this area so the position is important. She hopes to have someone to take on the position.

<u>Sunshine:</u> Gretchen will be asked to send a note to a member who had a recent fracture of her femur. The meeting was adjourned at 3:00 p.m.

**Ratify the Equal Rights Amendment** -- It's hard to believe the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) was first introduced into Congress 100 years ago, with the goal of guaranteeing equal legal rights for men and women under the U.S. Constitution. By 1977, the ERA was ratified by 35 of the necessary 38 states. However,

because Congress imposed an arbitrary deadline to complete ratification by 1982, the ERA could not become law when the final three states ratified years later (Nevada in 2017, Illinois in 2018, and finally Virginia in 2020).

With your help, we can change that. On January 24, Sen. Cardin filed <u>S.J. Res. 4</u> to remove the ratification deadline. The Senate used a procedural move called Rule XIV to allow the bill to be added to the Senate calendar and brought for a vote, bypassing the Committee process. Soon after, on January 31, Rep. Pressley introduced a similar bill in the House (<u>H.J. Res. 25</u>).

If passed, these measures would allow Nevada, Illinois and Virginia to count toward ratification, and the ERA would finally become the 28th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Women cannot wait for equality any longer. Urge Congress to support S.J. Res. 4/H.J. Res. 25.
