Big items to share with you!

Our long-time member, **Jeanine Rounds**, now lives out of state and she has gifted our Branch a second \$50,000, so we will be able to provide scholarships for Yuba College women for many years to come. Currently we award three STEM scholarships a year through the Yuba College Foundation. IN ADDITION, Jeanine has gifted another \$50,000 to AAUW through the Foundation. The Executive Council, in discussion with Jeanine, is looking at several ways to further her desire to help local women continue their post-secondary education.

Another longtime member and charter member of our Branch, **Dorothy Jang**, bequeathed \$5,000 to us. We are considering several options that will honor her dedication to our community and our branch. The Finance Committee (Martha, Sandy, and Liz) will meet before the next Executive Council meeting to finalize recommendations to the Council for the 2024-2025 budget to include funds toward community involvement and mission-based programs. branch until her death

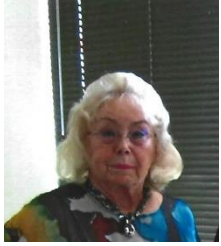
“Dorothy was a lovely, gracious woman. I was honored

It was to raise awareness that women working full time still only make 84 cents per dollar paid to men—a pay gap that is significantly worse for many women of color and for women working part-time or seasonal, said AAUW National in the March AAUW Washington Update. The Paycheck Fairness Act (H.R. 17/S. 728) would address several components of pay equity including ending the use of salary history to determine wages, pay data collection, and retaliation protections for discussing wages. 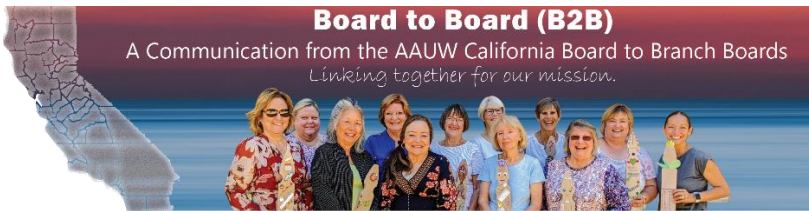
