

PUBLIC POLICY PRIORITIES AND THE ELECTIONS

Welcome to another presidential election year in the United States! We have you covered with all the resources.

In September, the Public Policy Committee will:

- Present a webinar on Get Out the Vote.
 More details to follow soon.
- Provide information on the California ballot initiatives that we are supporting.
- Provide Candidate Comparison Guides for competitive Congressional races in California.

Although the 2024 legislative session won't end until this fall, the governor has already started to sign bills. We are excited to let you know that three bills on our agenda have already been signed, AB 1955, AB1790, and AB2608. Hooray!

AB 1955 will prohibit school districts from requiring staff to notify parents if a student uses a different name or pronoun or identifies as a different gender than what is on their birth certificate. California is the first state in the nation to ban forced outings of transgender students.

AB 1790 will strengthen protections against sexual assault and harassment at California State University (CSU) campuses by requiring two reports

MARYSVILLE-YUBA CITY, CALIFORNIA, AAUW BRANCH from CSU on the status of their implementation of the State Auditor recommendations.

AB 2608 will require the California Community Colleges and the CSUs, and request the University of California, to provide educational and preventive information on sexual violence and harassment, including how to recognize if someone is at risk of drug-facilitated sexual assault.

A school board candidate questionnaire is now available, courtesy of the AAUW Fallbrook Branch. This is an excellent vetting tool. If a candidate approaches you for an endorsement or other support, ask them to complete this <u>questionnaire</u>, which also can be found on the Public Policy website in the School Project toolkit.

Executive Council Meeting August 8, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 1:05p.m. The minutes of the June EC Planning Meeting were approved with no changes.

Martha announced that Joyce Smith has graciously accepted the Membership Chair portfolio, vacated by Lee Jones. The vote to appoint Joyce to the Executive Council was as follows: Sandy/Liz/U.

Martha noted that Member-At-Large positions need to be appointed annually. The following persons have agreed to be new Members-At-Large: Ethel Jorgensen, Cheryl Hoke, Debbie Naylor, Libby Haraughty, and Mary Harris-Kasuba. Returning Members-At-Large are Betty Bonner, Artis Buerki, Carol Clark, Gretchen Capp, Kathy Nehl, and Joann Nixon.

Liz will check with Tana Thomas and Kathy Bertelsen regarding their interest.

<u>Tech Trek</u>: Carol has informed the women mentoring this summer's attendees that they need to prepare for the September Branch meeting. TTAG meets on August 29th. Martha will contact Joann to discuss the plans.

<u>Correspondence:</u> Thank you letters from the Tech Trek attendees were passed around for everyone to enjoy. There was also one from Sue Graue, who created the brochure for the 2024 Garden Tour, thanking AAUW for her honorarium.

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Sandy distributed the Final Treasurer's Report for 23-24 combined with the 24-25 Recommended budget.

She noted some changes: Speaker honorariums have increased. Annual donations to Casa de Esperanza and Girls on the Run have increased.

The 24-25 Budget and Narrative will be recommended to General Membership for adoption at the September branch meeting. A copy will be included in the 24-25 yearbook. Additionally, there is a budget line item:" Award to Support Women' which will most likely occur at the Day for Women event. Money was also budgeted to secure a table at the event.

The Recommended Budget will be printed in the 24-25 yearbook, to be distributed at next month's meeting.

<u>Public Policy:</u> The EC is considering assisting with a Voter Registration Drive. Materials would be provided by another group with a history of doing them. AAUW would register voters.

California State AAUW announced that three pieces of legislation that they initiated passed during the previous session.

<u>Membership:</u> Joyce hopes to contact members who have not renewed to find out why and encourage them to do so. Discussion occurred regarding expanding interest groups to motivate more members to become involved.

It may be necessary to find a new person to handle the Membership Treasurer role. Joyce will do some checking with possible interested women.

<u>By-Laws:</u> Christy reminded EC that they have been completed and passed.

Nominating Committee: Liz, Martha and Linda are members with Linda as Chair. Terms up this year will be Liz, Martha and Sandy. A proposed slate from the committee is due to the EC at the February meeting.

<u>Communication:</u> August 15th is the deadline for September's Feather Vane. EC members appreciated that Artis sent out a summer newsletter which wasn't the norm. She pointed out that there was a lot of news and it's important to keep members informed and interested.

Regarding the webpage, she is listing Executive Council Officers but not Members-At-Large, which is a change.

Facebook is monitored by Gwyn. She is concerned about people unintentionally reposting scams and is willing to do a brief Inservice if members would find it helpful. Perhaps, the page would get more interest if Interest-Group photos were utilized.

<u>Scholarships:</u> Liz will be getting her committee ready ass the applications will be reviewed in a month. Artis suggested that recipients attend the June Branch meeting and talk about their plans.

Interbranch: Carol and Liz attended last night and there were 19 people at the gathering. Liz turned over her Presidential gavel to an Oroville representative.

Coalition Brunch: It is scheduled for December 7th.

Peach Tree Country Club has agreed to a cost of \$28 for attendees, and we will sell tickets for \$30, with \$2 per ticket being given to the youth group who perform. Artis is chair of Coalition Brunch planning committee, and Martha will be the Mistress of Ceremonies.
