Lobby Days Report – by Gwyn Baker On April 8th, Claudia Chandler and I participated in AAUW's lobby days. I was thankful for Claudia's experience with navigating the intricacies of parking and driving in downtown Sacramento as we arrived at morning rush hour. We started our day in AAUW's Legislative Advocate's office on L Street in the refurbished Senator Hotel. Our launch meeting included a Zoom address delivered by State Treasurer, Fiona Ma. She served in the Legislature from 2006-2012 and told us what an impact it has on Legislators to hear from groups like ours. The team that Claudia and I were on included Chico members Jan Britton and Michelle Rasmussen and was led by Carol Holzgrafe of Chico, Paradise, and Morgan Hill AAUW branches.

Every year AAUW California selects bills that focus on the well-being of women and children. This year's bills were SB 771, Social Media Platforms Endangering Californians, which

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AAUW CA sponsored; SB 418, Ensure Equal Access to Care for All; and a bill that AAUW opposes, AB 579, Yaeli's Law. We met with the aides for three legislators: two southern California democrats, and our own Assembly member, James Gallagher.

Claudia and I were speaking for SB 771 which would clarify that a social media platform could be held liable for Al-algorithmic distribution of hate speech. In January, Meta dramatically altered its practices to remove safeguards they had provided to protect marginalized communities from targeted online hate speech. This bill would enact financial consequences for allowing algorithms to aid in intimidation and threats. SB 418 would prohibit a health plan or insurance provider from denying coverage to a person based upon their race, national origin, age, disability, or sex including sex characteristics such as intersex traits, pregnancy and gender identity. Carol tactfully spoke in opposition of Yaeli's Law which is a bill that balances parents' rights with the rights of transgender children. Yaeli's Law says that it is not harmful for parents to refuse to use a child's name/pronouns and that refusal to provide or allow gender-affirming care should not be allowed as a basis for custody or removal decisions. However, research shows that transgender children are more likely to experience homelessness when they live in households that do not accept their gender identity and up to 70% of transgender youth attempt suicide when they live in an unaccepting household. Lobby Days was a great way to network with members from other branches and find out about their activities. We got an inside look at how legislation works, and it was a pleasure to partner with the ladies from Chico. Some of these bills might not make it past the Senate or be heavily amended by the time they reach the Assembly,

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VOTING IS

MORE THAN A RIGHT, IT IS A PRIVILEGE!

April and May are the months to vote when AAUW National (April 14th - May 13th) and AAUW California (April 26th- May 16th) kick off voting on various issues, bylaws, and board positions. Public Policy, Governance, and the nominating chair have been sending information since January and asking for input and candidates. Now comes the time for members to make their voices heard when accepting, rejecting, or selecting ballot initiatives and candidates. We have a contested election for AAUW California Director positions, whereby you may select two choices from four candidates (read the candidate bios HERE), a dues increase measure, and proposed Public Policy Priorities, making your vote even more important.

All members with email addresses will receive their ballots electronically, and those without email addresses will receive their ballots in the US Mail to be returned by the closing dates.

Why bring this up? While a repairman was working near us, we were discussing an election result we were not happy about and the repairman said: "You are so lucky here, there will be another election at a scheduled time, and you may work for a better outcome; in Moscow nothing has changed in 25 years with no end in sight!"

Take Action to Help Kids Feel Safe at

School, by Kathi Harper, Chair, Public Policy School Board Project

Many of our members have expressed concerns about the potential for ICE raids in our local schools. These intrusions on school grounds are already happening in some places and are having a significant detrimental impact on these families, especially for their children. Some of the ramifications have included:

- Parents not showing up at school events fearing agents might be there
- Students don't want to come to school, fearing their parents will be taken while they're gone
- Children not learning, consumed by fear of agents coming on campus to take them away

Here are some things you should know:

- Current law (Plyler v Doe 1982) held that all children, even undocumented, have a constitutional right to free public education
- In 2011, DHS issued the "Sensitive Locations" policy, which prohibited raids from certain places including schools
- Although the President has attempted to revoke the order, Executive Orders and Actions cannot change statutes or regulations
- There are currently 4 lawsuits challenging the attempted revocation; 3 from churches have been successful so far, 1 from a school in Denver has resulted in a denial of a request for a temporary injunction
- Current law also prohibits ICE entry on campuses without a warrant
- Even if they have a warrant to enter, that does not entitle them to have access to private/protected student records

Here are two things you can do:

- Urge your school boards/districts to issue a "Safe Zone" Resolution – template can be found here: <u>Guidance on Immigration Issues</u> | NEA
- Engage your branch members in a postcardwriting campaign to their school boards with following message: WE STAND WITH Immigrant students and LGBTQ+ youth.


