Over the years those projects were turned over to other organizations, and the Coalition continued to hold the Holiday Brunch.

Brunch will take place on Saturday, December 13, at Hillcrest Catering, 210 Julie Drive, Yuba City. That's

the same location where AAUW holds our monthly meetings. Over the years Delta Cappa Gamma, PEO, Bridges to Housing, Soroptimist, Marysville Art Club, Sutter Buttes Garden Club, Blue Star Moms, American Red Cross and others have been a part of the Holiday Brunch. That changes each year, but the objective of the event has stayed the same....networking with other like-minded people who believe in volunteering to help others in our community is still our goal. At the Holiday Brunch we all talk about our fundraisers and projects, and we enjoy the music provided by local children's groups. This year the entertainment will be provided by Faith Christian High School.

Executive Council Meeting October 9, 2025

In Attendance: Kathy Nehl, Martha Bunce, Carol Clark, Linda Zall, Brenda Mock, Christy Estabrook, Gwyn Baker, Ellen O'Neil, Artis Buerki, Sandy Davini, Liz Skelly

The minutes of the last meeting were approved with no changes.

Note – the word branch has been replaced by affiliate.

Sandy started the meeting on a happy note: Jo Hilling celebrated her 98th birthday yesterday.

Martha began the business portion by announcing that the Executive Council needs to appoint a member to replace Joyce Smith as Communications Leader. Brenda Mock accepted the request to do so and a vote was taken: Martha/Carol/Unanimous.

Correspondence: None to report

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> The 2025-2026 budget was approved by members at the September 20,2025 Affiliate Meeting.

<u>Public Policy:</u> Martha noted that the Board-to-Board emails have a substantial section relating to public policy.

AAUW, at the national level has put their support behind California's Proposition 50. At the next Affiliate Brunch, on October 18th, flyers that outline reasons to support it will be on the tables.

There are cases before the Supreme Court that would weaken the Voters Rights Act. Gloria Blackwell, CEO of AAUW and other members are attending sessions in supporting those arguing in opposition.

One national bill that would make voting harder is the SAVE Act requiring proof of citizenship in order to register. Proof of citizenship would have to match one's birth name. This discriminates against married women who have taken their husband's name. It will also disenfranchise low-income people who can't afford a passport or certified birth certificate and those rural citizens who don't have access to the places to obtain them. The SAVE Act isn't necessary because there has never been a problem with non-citizens voting.

Four of the bills supported by California AAUW in the recent California legislative session, are on the Governor's desk. Others are still pending.

Membership: Linda Zall has proposed allowing people who do not have a degree to become "AAUW Allies'. While not full members, they would have access to the same opportunities as regular members. A \$100 donation per year would be requested, half of which would go for operating costs and half to Tech Trek. Artis moved to welcome non-degreed allies to the affiliate. Artis/Kathy/Unanimous

<u>Scholarships:</u> Liz reported that her committee chose two Yuba College students to receive \$500 Women's Club scholarships and 4 were each awarded a \$1000 AAUW scholarship.

Since the AAUW scholarships are administered by the Yuba College Foundation, the students are not aware that AAUW awarded them. Liz has asked the Director of Financial to provide addresses of the students in order for them to be invited to a Day for Women and to an Affiliate Meeting.

Additionally, Liz has offered that AAUW members are available to students on financial aid who need mentoring.

Nominating Committee: In April, a vote will be held for three openings on the Executive Council. The terms ending are those of Linda, Ellen and Sandy. They are willing to run again. However, everyone is asked to recruit new and additional members for the council.

<u>Communications:</u> Deadline for the November Feather Vane is October 22nd.

Webmaster: Artis noted that the site now has photos of the 2025 Garden Tour.

Gwyn reminded us that there are two Facebook pages. One is AAUW-MVYC, private for members and one must ask to join. The other is public.

Affiliate Meeting reservations are at 30 and a 35 minimum is required. Martha suggested that those planning to miss the meeting for the protests at 10:00 a.m. go to Chico's protest instead as It is in the afternoon. This is "Soctober" and all attendees are asked to bring socks for unhoused people, preferably cotton.

<u>Programs:</u> October will be all about the Sutter County Library. The new Director, Literacy and Children's Director will be presenting. In November, AAUW member, Phyllis Smith, will be speaking on the historical Marysville Cemetery.

<u>STEM Conference:</u> The date is March 30, 2026. Already, 50% of the presenters have been secured.

<u>Garden Tour:</u> Members of the committee have already visited potential gardens. Artis and others will solicit sponsors with letters going out no later than November 15th. The next committee meeting is November 6th, 9:30a.m. at the Sutter County Library.

<u>Tech Trek:</u> Martha will solicit donations from the Yuba and Sutter County School Superintendents. October 15th is the deadline to tell CA. AAUW how many students we will be sending. Per usual, we are planning on five.

Interbranch: We are hosting this year's luncheon on March 7th, which is the same date as the Day for Women. We will still sponsor a table and invite our scholarship winners to attend with AAUW members.

<u>Coalition Brunch:</u> It is scheduled for December 13th at Hillcrest Catering and the cost is \$30. Tickets will be available at the AAUW Affiliate meeting on Nov 15.

The meeting adjourned at 3:45p.m.




